


- Michener argues that creation should neither be reduced to a product of God nor regarded as identical to God.
- Creation is NOT a done deal.

"As a gift of God coming directly from his being, creation is integrally linked to God; it is not simply a done and settled event for humans to handle as they wish. God gave of himself in his act of creation, he gives of himself presently in and through creation, and he will give of himself as he redeems and renews creation in the future." p.38-39

- Hugh Ross provides comprehensive scientific evidence for climate change, the severe consequences that we will face, and what we can do to preserve our physical environmental in order to benefit all life on Earth.
- Rossing and Buitendag extend the discussion of the term "ecodomy" as it pertains to climate change. They argue for the current times as a "kairos" moment, a moment "of hope and urgency".

Methodology

Mixed-method:

Use an online survey to collect both quantitative and qualitative data.

Respondents:

- 109 Christians without any no leadership role
- 62 Christians with a leadership role (Pastor, minister, elder, deacon, Sunday school teacher, cell group/fellowship leader, Professor/instructor of theology).

Questions cover their position on or perception of:

- Climate change and science
- Green lifestyle and policies (e.g. Paris Climate Accord)
- Christian Nationalism (e.g. The US is chosen by God as a Christian nation.)
- Prosperity gospel (e.g. God will grant wealth and health to believers.)

Data analysis:

- Data visualization for quantitative data
- Content analysis for qualitative data (MAXQDA).

• The federal government should declare the United States a Christian nation.




A nationwide sample from Cloud Research




More Christian Nationalism -> less concerned with Climate change




Christian leadership is worse than lay people






More Christian Nationalism -> Climate change will never harm people




Christian leaders are worse






Many lay people do not know what Paris Accord is



More Christian Nationalism → don't support Paris Accord




More prosperity gospel → less concerned



- Christian nationalism and prosperity gospel are inversely related to concerns for climate change.
- Christian leaders who subscribe to the preceding theology tend to be less concerned with climate change and opposed to the Paris Accord.
- It is alarming that most laypeople do not know what the Paris Accord is.
- We need to educate both Christian leaders and laypeople.

Do you have a hybrid, electric or hydrogen-powered car?




For the survey question "Do you have a hybrid, electric or hydrogen-powered car?"


For the survey question "Did you install solar panel in your home?"

*Excluded words from question: solar, panel, and install.


Qualitative data suggests that for those who do not have a hybrid or alternative-energy vehicle, cost seems to be a common factor




Do you trust science in general?

Data suggests that respondents are treating science and climate science differently.



Quantitative data from the survey and qualitative data from openended questions suggest...

- 1) The majority of respondents are not yet using alternative-energy vehicles nor solar panels
- 2) The main reason appear to be cost (money, expensive, afford).
- 3) Respondents are treating **science** and **climate science** differently.
