



## Research questions

 Why do young people stop attending church or/and giving up their faith? What are the most crucial factors?



- Presser & Chaves (2007). Is religious service attendance declining?
- In the US weekly attendance at religious services declined between 1950 and 1990. But it has been stable since 1990.




- Chaves (2011): Religious trends in US
- The portion of Americans who never attend church has increased from 13% in 1990 to 22% in 2008.
- Fewer people grow up in a religious household (from 70% for those born before 1900 to about 45% born after 1970)
- Parental factor is crucial (Vaidyanthan, 2011)

- Declining belief in inerrancy of the Bible
- Declining confident in church leadership
- More disapproval of religious leaders' political involvement

- David Kinnaman (2011): "You lost me: Why young Christians are leaving church...and rethinking faith"
- Young Christians perceive that Christians are too confident that they know the answers of many important questions;
- Churches are out of step with the scientific world we live in;

- Christianity present complicated issues in a simplistic way;
- Christianity is anti-intellectual;
- Young Christians were turned off by the Creationism-evolution debate.



## Limitations of prior research

- Each study focuses some domains only.
- This study includes multiple dimensions:
  - Intellectual factors (e.g. New atheism, postmodernism)
  - Church experience
  - Personality traits (e.g. Schwartz's Value Survey)

## Sampling

- Students at Azusa Pacific University
- Must be Christians or ex-Christians; 18 years old or older.
- Convenience sampling
- Sample size = 87

# Dependent variable: Faith categories

- Committed Christians: I continue to attend church and have faith in Christ.
- Doubters: I still attend church but have serious doubts of my faith in Christ.
- Disengaged: I have not attended church for over one year but I maintain my faith in Christ.
- Deconverted: I am not attending church and have abandoned my faith in Christ.


## Data analysis


- Bootstrap forest is superior to GLM or other conventional procedures:
- It can include many predictors without worrying about lacking degrees of freedom or too many parameters to estimate.
- It is immune against missing data and noise.
- It can yield a parsimonious model and high predictive accuracy.
- It can rank order the importance of variables.

## Data analysis

- The open-ended responses are analyzed by both content analysis and text mining.
- Both procedures are aimed to unveil the common threads pertaining to disengagement and deconversion that are not detected with the quantitative methods.



## **Predictive accuracy**




## **Top 10 predictors**

- Two are about psychological factors (stimulation and universalism)
- One is an intellectual issue (Creationism)


# I always have channels to express my suggestions to the church.
